### Our Mission

The Lake County Emergency Management Agency (EMA) will protect Lake County communities by coordinating and integrating all activities necessary to build, sustain, and improve the capability to mitigate against, prepare for, respond to, and recover from threatened or actual natural disasters, acts of terrorism, or other man-made disasters.


## About the Lake County EMA

Established under Chapter 5502 of the Ohio Revised Code

The Primary focus of the agency, when not in a response or recovery mode, is to ensure that Lake County, along with its more than 230,000 residents, is prepared for an emergency or disaster and to lead the mitigation efforts against the future disasters.

This is a tiered effort beginning at the local level.

If the incident overwhelms local resources, or effects multiple political subdivisions within the county, it can become a county incident and the Lake County Commissioners, under the advisement of the EMA Director can declare an emergency and request State of Ohio assistance. If the emergency exceeds the capacity of the state, aid can be requested from FEMA



Depending on the type of disaster damage, the President can issue a major disaster declaration for Public Assistance (aid to public and certain nonprofit groups for emergency protective measures and repair of infrastructure), Individual Assistance (aid to individuals, households or businesses) or Hazard Mitigation assistance (funding to reduce future damage to public and private property).

### Phases of Emergency Management

1. Mitigation

3. Response

2. Preparedness

4. Recovery

### Mitigation

Activities undertaken to avoid, eliminate or reduce the probability of occurrence, or to lessen the effects of an emergency/disaster. It involves actions to protect lives and property and to defend against attacks



### Preparedness



Activities undertaken to prepare for disasters and emergencies and facilitate future response and recovery efforts. Includes writing emergency operations plans and procedures, training, exercises, evacuation planning, public education and warning.

### Response

Activities undertaken in the immediate aftermath of a disaster that help to reduce causalities and damage, and that expedite recovery. Response activities include warning, evacuation, rescue and other similar operations

### **Grand River Conservation Area**

he 16-acre site a natural floodplain for the river — was home to the Gristmill and Millstone condominium complexes until July 2006, when the Great Flood buried some of the buildings in more than 17 feet of water rendering them uninhabitable


The city was able to complete acquisition and floodplain restoration, thanks to millions of dollars in grants from the Federal Emergency Management and Ohio Environmental

Recovery from disasters are shortand long-term actions taken by disaster survivors and governmental entities to rebuild communities. Actions include helping disaster survivors return to permanent housing and replace essential personal property, reconstruction of infrastructure, community redevelopment activities and longterm redevelopment planning.

# STEP 2 Make a plan

You aren't prepared — until you make a plan.





Put together a plan by discussing these 4 questions with your family, friends, or household to start your emergency plan.

- ➤ How will I receive <u>emergency alerts and warnings</u>?
- ➤ What is my shelter plan?
- ➤ What is my <u>evacuation</u> route?
- ➤ What is my <u>family/household communication plan</u>?



### Consider specific needs in your household.

As you prepare your plan, tailor your plans and supplies to your specific daily living needs and responsibilities. Discuss your needs and responsibilities and how people in the network can assist each other with communication, care of children, business, pets, or specific needs like the operation of durable medical equipment.

Create your own personal network for specific areas where you need assistance. Keep in mind some these factors when developing your plan:

Different ages of members within your household

Responsibilities for assisting others

Locations frequented

Dietary needs

Medical needs including prescriptions and equipment

Disabilities or access and functional needs including devices and equipment

Languages spoken

Cultural and religious considerations

Pets or service animals

Households with school-aged children

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





# Lake County Local Emergency Planning Committee

The Lake County Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) is established under the Emergency Planning and Community Right to Know Act, or <a href="EPCRA">EPCRA</a>. This was passed as Title III of the Superfund Amendments and Reauthorization Act of 1986 (<a href="SARA Title III">SARA Title III</a>) on October 17, 1986. This provides for a robust chemical emergency preparedness and response capability.

Our objectives include implementing the local emergency planning committee rules and requirements of SARA Title III, to prepare and maintain a comprehensive chemical emergency response plan for Lake County and to provide information to the public upon request.

# Lake County Local Emergency Planning Committee

In Lake County, the LEPC is the agency responsible for implementing these objectives.

Headquarters are located in the Lake County Emergency Operation Center; it is chaired by seasoned local emergency responders who work with an 18 member Board to oversee and direct policies aimed at meeting the mission of protecting and informing the local community.

### Lake County Sheriff's SWAT

The Lake County Sheriff's Office SWAT Team was formed in the 1970's and was the first to exist in Ohio. It employs sophisticated equipment and maintains a rigorous training schedule on negotiations techniques, chemical agent deployment, tactical paramedic training, long-rifle shooting, less then lethal weaponry, and covert building searches. The Lake County Sheriff's Office SWAT Team maintains the ability to respond to high risk incidents at any hour of the day or night, regardless of weather. The unit is on a 24-hour call-out basis at all times.

## Lake County Bomb Squad

### **Bomb Squad**

The Lake County Bomb Squad was formed in 1993 when the Lake County Crime Lab and the Mentor Police Department combined their personnel and equipment into one unit to handle all bomb squad calls in Lake County. It has since developed into a multi-agency unit with members from the Mentor Police and Fire Departments, Geauga County Sheriff's Office, Wickliffe Police Department, and Painesville Township Fire Department.

The Bomb Squad has primary responsibilities over Lake, Geauga, and Ashtabula Counties. They are, however, ready to assist other counties should the need arise.

The Lake County Bomb Squad is accredited by the F.B.I. and has three certified Bomb Technicians. It is equipped with the latest tools necessary to get the job done in a safe and efficient manner. The personnel train monthly and attend a one-week re-certification class every three years at Redstone Arsenal in Huntsville, Alabama.


